Health Systems Registration

Hospital Registration

Applies to a single hospital location. All internal units and departments at that location may participate under one registration.

Example: Hospital A selects Hospital Registration and provides access to its own departments only. Affiliates or other facilities may not use this registration.

Health System Registration

Applies to an entire health system, including corporate offices and all affiliated hospitals. All units and departments within the registered system may participate.

Example: Health System B selects Health System Registration and provides access to every affiliated hospital and its corporate teams.

Compliance with the Emergency Medical Treatment and Labor Act (EMTALA) is an organization-wide responsibility. Decisions involving medical screening examinations, on-call physician responsibilities, available services, and patient transfers may cross departments and involve external organizations. This three-part webinar series will translate federal EMTALA requirements and Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) interpretive guidance into practical strategies hospitals can apply across the organization.

Using recent federal enforcement actions, including from Illinois and other states, participants will examine:

- Recent updates to CMS interpretive guidance;
- Requirements for an adequate medical screening examination;

- Behavioral health and obstetric emergency scenarios;
- EMTALA signage requirements;
- Stabilization standards and appropriate patient transfer requirements;
- Recipient hospital responsibilities under EMTALA;
- On-call coverage expectations and physician response obligations; and
- Documentation requirements for high-risk EMTALA situations, including patients who leave against medical advice or without being seen.

Part 2: Screening, Transfers and Vulnerable Populations

This session will cover high-risk EMTALA situations involving medical screening examinations, signage and patient transfers. You'll examine what constitutes an adequate medical screening examination for behavioral health, obstetric and other patients; what required signage must say and where it must be posted; and what constitutes an appropriate certification of false labor. You'll also review the elements of an appropriate transfer, how requirements differ for emergency department, observation and inpatient cases, and what must be included on the transfer form.

- Define what language must be on required EMTALA signage and where it must be located.
- Describe what constitutes an adequate medical screening examination for behavioral health, obstetric and other patients.
- Describe what constitutes an appropriate certification of false labor.
- Illustrate what an appropriate transfer entails and what must be included on the transfer form.
